Over the last 12 months, God has given me much strength and comfort through reading scripture. The stories scripture retells often explore human experience of God in light of crisis or uncertainty. From the panic of the Israelites as Goliath stood before them, to the crisis Ruth and Naomi faced through grief and famine – scripture's story proclaims the truth of a faithful God in all seasons of life.

One of the stories I've read and found most fruitful spiritually is the story of the Israelites after escaping Egypt, passing through the red sea, and then spending 40 years in the desert (read all of Exodus!). Every aspect of the communal life together was changed as a result of their Exodus and passing through the waters.

Despite the struggle this community that God calls 'mine' faced, despite their sometimes complaining, despite their taking matters into their own hands and making a golden calf, God was faithful and continued to be faithful to them:

"'I am the LORD, and I will free you from the burdens of the Egyptians and deliver you from slavery to them. I will redeem you with an outstretched arm and with mighty acts of judgment." Exodus 6:7, NRSV

This question was raised in a book 'What If' by Randall Munroe, kindly given to me as a present at Christmas, perhaps to prevent me from keep asking "how long would it take a number 700 bus with 20 BRMC Whist Club members aboard to travel to the moon from Earth and how much would it cost each passenger?" The last question is easy to reply. The answer is nothing as they would have their bus passes!

The explorer, David Livingstone, once addressed a group of students at Glasgow University (*obviously before the current trend of excluding speakers*). When he rose to speak, he bore on his body the marks of his African struggles. Several illnesses on nearly thirty occasions had left him gaunt and haggard. His left arm, crushed by a lion hung limp by his side.
