We've worshipped for a season in our homes via zoom, YouTube, phone and print as well as in-building. We've shared fellowship by phone or physically distanced on park benches. We have humbly enabled our building to declare hope to our community through making our hall available to Bognor Foodbank – a season that will soon come to an end as they transition back to running from their hub in Argyle road in early June. Many of these possibilities may only have been for a season, but they have been a season filled with hope, possibility, and the presence of God.

As we worship in the Easter season and journey towards celebrating Pentecost, when God's Spirit is outpoured on the early church, we are reminded of another crisis that was also filled with hope. Jesus had been crucified, his friends lost, uncertain and broken.

Yet Jesus unexpectedly arose, emerging from death's dark tomb to new life and to offer us a new, brighter, better way of living, where we are forgiven, made whole and invited to journey with him all the days of our lives.

I wonder, as we journey through this next season emerging from lockdown, what unexpected, new, brighter way of living and serving as BRMC Christ is revealing to us. How is Christ giving you hope today?

## **MIRACLES DO HAPPEN!**

Early in Lent, my daughter was asked by the minister of St. James C of E Church in Emsworth, if she with a small team, would produce a flowered cross; preferably double sided as it would be displayed in the centre of Emsworth Square, where it would hopefully catch people's attention from all angles.

Joanna has learned how to make door wreaths etc. and readily accepted the rather larger challenge. Three weeks into Lent and all the necessary materials had been purchased or promised, except the wood for the cross.

On a solo 3 mile run locally, Joanna began to worry about where the wood might come from. With many suppliers in lockdown, it was beginning to be a real worry. Imagine her amazement when she approached her home to find a builder's skip completely blocking her driveway but filled with lengths of wood!

There was a building project nearby and 2 of the joiners soon apologised and explained that there had been a congestion of vehicles and the safest way to solve it was to park the skip – very temporarily – on Joanna's drive. To their relief, Joanna raised no objection but begged some of the pieces of wood, explaining why she wanted them. Three suitable lengths were selected and a fourth was cut to size and delivered within the hour.

Those workmen showed great interest and said they would go with their families at Easter, especially to see the completed cross. Who knows what that brief contact with the cross might awaken?

Following this event of Joanna arriving home to see the skip at exactly the right time, she emailed her minister saying she felt certain the plan had God's blessing, and He had supplied their needs for Easter weekend in Emsworth. Cynics may feel it was just a lucky coincidence, but we consider it a miracle.

I think it is very likely that little miracles happen around us every day but we just don't notice them, but we should still be grateful to be alive and well (as far we can expect to be at some of our advanced ages!) and comparatively safe, thanks be to God. Let us always remember those not so fortunate as ourselves in our giving , our prayers and our actions.

To close, may we all be more aware of God's care for us. Even when life deals us difficulties, He is there with us – we only have to accept His love so freely given.

I hope you all had a blessed Easter.

## **DAVE AND BEV CHITTENDEN – AN INTRODUCTION.....**

Hello, we are Dave and Bev Chittenden and we arrived from Durban on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2020 and will be pleased to meet you all! We only attended your lovely Church 3 times, before lockdown!

Dave was born in Chatham, Kent 74 years ago but moved to Salisbury in the old Rhodesia with his English Dad and Scottish Mom when he was 3 months old. I was born in Salisbury 69 years ago to an English Dad and a South African Mom. We met during the height of the Rhodesian bush war, when Dave was in the territorial forces of the army. We married in 1977. When we were expecting our first daughter Lia, Dave started talking about leaving Zimbabwe and moving to Australia or South Africa, but Australia was too far from my beloved family and in 1981 when Lia was about 7 months old, we left for Durban with the few possessions the Zimbabwe Government allowed us to take. We had only been in Durban about 6 weeks when our car was stolen, but Dave was offered a good job in Johannesburg and we moved there. After about 6 months Dave saw an advert for a country hotel in Aliwal North, in the Cape Province. He had got fed up with Johannesburg traffic and never being home when Lia was awake. So we went and looked at the hotel and thought it had merit. We moved there with no hotel experience. It was very hectic at first and in a very Afrikaans area. The Afrikaans people, largely farming community were very warm hearted and while we wanted to practice our Afrikaans, they wanted to practice their English.

We stayed for 5 years and our second daughter Amy was born there in 1985. In 1987, our 5 year lease on the business was up and we decided to move back to Durban. We bought a lovely old house overlooking the harbour where we lived for 25 years. Dave worked as Operations Manager for a friend, Peter, but after a while he left to set up his own company, which he ran for 16 years.

Dave was involved in the MOTHS for 33 years, was on the Housing Management committee of a large retirement village and helped raise funds for the care of the frail. He enjoyed running and going to the gym, but his ill health over the last 15 years has made him more sedentary. He enjoys doing crosswords, sudoku, reading and watching sport on tv.

When we moved back to Durban, I got a job as an administrator at an industrial air conditioning company. After 2 years the senior management decided to start their own company and invited me to go too, with a small shareholding as an incentive. We ran the business very successfully for 7 years and then sold out to an American company who had identified us as the best service company in Durban. That was where I stayed as the financial and administration manager until I retired in 2019. Our daughters grew up and they both went to University. Lia qualified as an attorney, notary public and conveyancer and Amy opted for humanities and qualified as a social worker.

Once they were independent, I reconnected with my life-long love of stamps and joined a Philatelic Society. I also got involved in collecting, sorting and packing stamps for Durban and surrounding areas for the old Flying Doctor charity.



I worked at a stamp fair once a month, which raised money to help disadvantaged students from the Zululand area to study medicine or fields related thereto, the understanding being they would return to their communities when they qualified and 'give something back'.

Eight years ago both our daughters had married, and we sold our old family home and bought a townhouse in a secure complex in the same area. Both girls were close by and we wanted to stay near my Mom who was in a retirement complex there too. Lia and Warren had delighted us with our first grandson. I was a very hands-on GoGo (Granny) and very involved with our grandson and the second one when he arrived 3 years later.

Our local Methodist Church, called Manning Road Methodist is 150 years old and was our spiritual home. We were involved in a number of Church activities, including fundraising, and serving as a communion steward and hospitality steward. Manning Road was involved in feeding the poor and we provided a hot meal every Sunday evening to between 120 and 140 people. They are involved in helping fund Makabongwe School in a very poor area of Durban, which started on the pavement and grew into a fully-fledged school.

We also worked with the Denis Hurley Centre assisting with a creche for children of homeless people and people seeking work, and we started a vegetable garden to enable the children to be able to get a decent meal. Through Denis Hurley we collected books which were sold for a small fee to booksellers who resold them on the street to make a living.

Dave had been keen to come and live in England for some time as the writing was on the wall in SA and we saw things going the same way as Zimbabwe. We came on holiday in 2019 and made the decision to move. The final deciding factor came when I came home from shopping one afternoon and was attacked by armed men in our garage. They ripped my jewellery off and I screamed at them. Dave was so brave, he came out and threw a metal ironing board over the top of the car door at them and then when one of them started coming after him, he ran inside, slammed the security gate and came back with his gun. He shot at them, luckily not hitting them, but they ran away. They had a getaway car blocking our electronic gate and Dave shot a second time and hit the car as they sped off. Thank God we were not injured, apart from scrapes, and bruises, but we were both severely traumatised.

Last year with Covid and lockdown we couldn't leave until November. We came to Bognor as Dave's brother John and his wife Sheila live here and we stayed with them for our 14-day quarantine period. We have settled down very well in our rented flat in The Steyne and feel so safe and grateful to be here. God has blessed us richly.

## From Afghanistan to Vietnam....

### Prayers for the Persecuted Church

I was recently given a prayer handbook produced by **Barnabusfund**, which is a Christian charity working to provide hope & aid to the persecuted Church. There are 39 countries included, each with a page of information about how God's people in that place are being affected. It horrified me that there are so many places where Christians are being persecuted. I had read about Iran & Iraq, Pakistan, China and maybe 1 or 2 other places, but hadn't realised it was so widespread. Maybe it's my ignorance or maybe I'm not alone. Whichever the case, I thought I'd bring this information to you and highlight just some of the difficulties our wider Christian family face.

These are the countries listed in the booklet:

A number of these countries enshrine Islam as the state religion and the authorities have no sympathy for any other religion or way of life. Other countries enshrine Hinduism or Buddhism.

The freedom to worship is exclusive to these religions and ways of life. Christianity faces punishments such as imprisonment, execution & amputation. Christians can be:

- Siezed as slaves
- Imprisoned, tortured, beheaded
- Murdered in their villages (whole villages)
- Have their crops and livestock destroyed
- Forced to flee to the hills
- Refused all basic needs
- Women & Girls raped

The Covid lockdown has seen an increase in targeted hate and violence in many places and the prayers of Christians around the world have never been more important.

- 4 prayer tables
- music
- pictures & scripture on the screen
- A tomb(!) and a display of purple fabric and a crown of thorns on a cross.
- Prayer candles to light

The prayer tables were designed to inspire quiet reflection on our Lord Jesus. There was a lot of material available to choose from, such as prayer cards, pictures, candles to light, books, prayer tree, posters and so much more. Those involved gave up a lot of time and worked hard. I have had some lovely 'thank you' phone calls, **so well done everyone involved!**

On Sunday morning I arrived at Church to find Hazel (Denman) outside dressing the large cross with dozens of flowers of every colour, which we left standing outside for all to see. It was absolutely breathtaking!

The tables and displays were used by about 20 people on Friday and 5 or 6 on Sunday. It was so good to have our Church open again, offering a quiet sanctuary to be with God.

In Joseph's garden is history's only empty grave. Christianity has no shrines to visit, no dusty remains to venerate, no tombs at which to worship. Many good men have lived, and still live, in the memory of those who knew them, but there is only one Man who conquered death - Jesus Christ, and He will live for ever.

### **The resurrection of Christ brings hope.**

As the human organism is dependent on a supply of oxygen, so humanity is dependent on its supply of hope. Yet today hopelessness and despair are everywhere. Peter, who himself was given to despair during the episode of Calvary, writes in a triumphant note:

There is hope that mistakes and sins can be forgiven. There is hope that we can have joy, peace, assurance, and security in the midst of despair of this age.
